Reporting on road traffic incidents

The media has significant power to educate the public about social issues and drive change, which can have positive and negative consequences on road safety in WA. **Be part of positive change in the media with these simple steps as you report on road traffic incidents.**

Help Seeking Information

List at least two crisis support services in any news article, which is selected based on the mode of communication and topic at hand.



Describing the Road Incident

It is vital that all reports of road traffic incidents are presented in context, only include information known to be accurate and provide a balanced portrayal of the incident.



Language

It is important to consider the language used and how it may be interpreted by the audience.



Use of Imagery

While images may appear generic or dated to you, they may be readily identifiable by those involved or their loved ones. Photos and video footage should not be published or broadcast before all families involved in the road traffic incident have been notified.



Interview and Consent

Informed consent should be obtained from an appropriate contact of the individual/s involved in the road traffic incident before identifying those involved.



Comments from Experts

The inclusion of expert comments from individuals who specialise in the relevant field, can assist you in interpreting data providing context to the causality of the incident.



Story Prominence

Adequate length and placement of the road traffic report is important. Short duration or inferior placement can appear as an afterthought, which undermines the severity of the issue.



Looking After Yourself

Reporting road traffic incidents can be distressing, and it is important to safeguard your wellbeing and look out for one another in the workplace.
